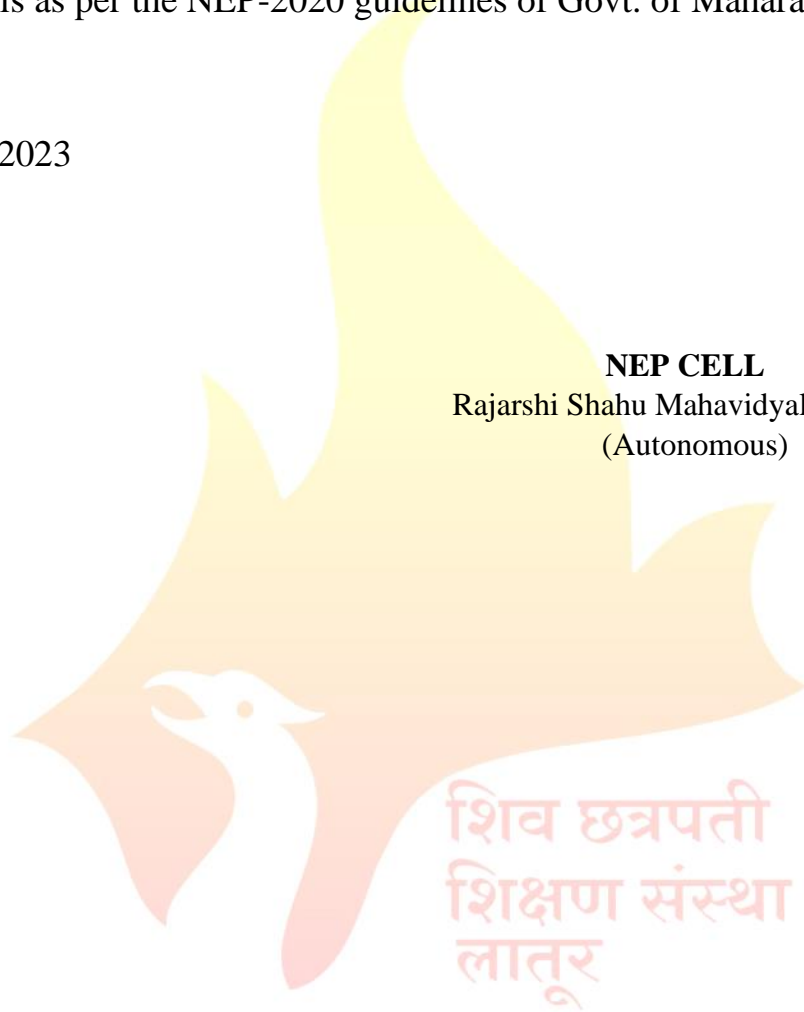

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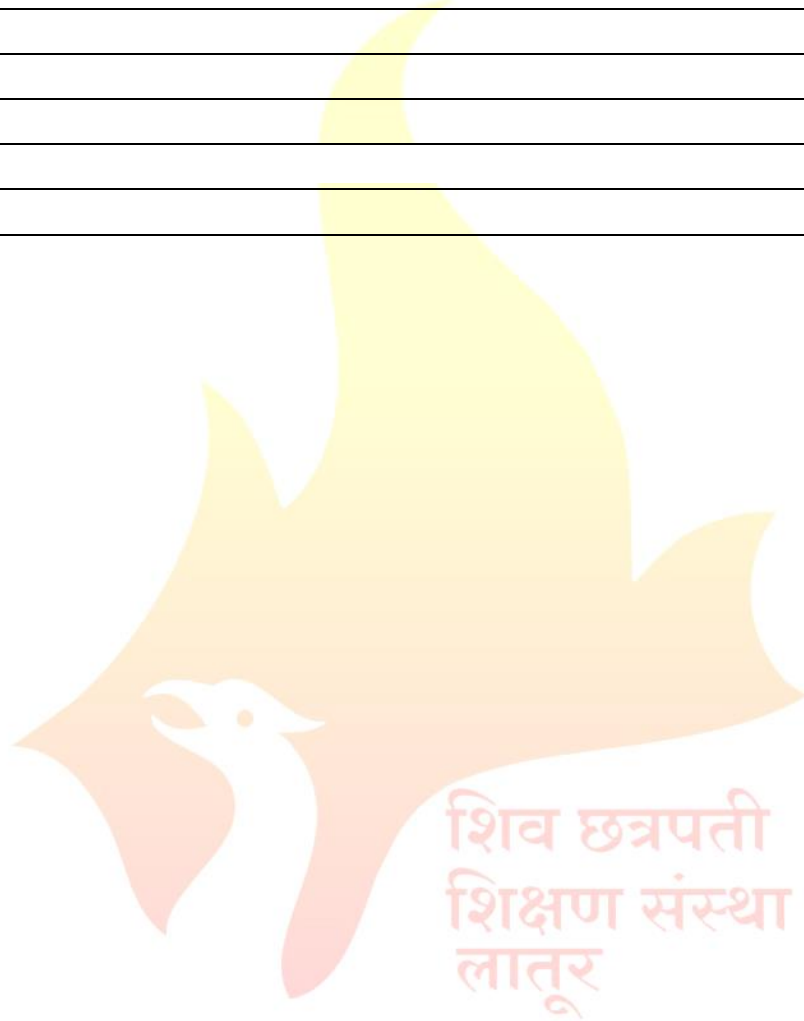

Extra -academic activities

Additional Credits for Online Courses:
