Guidelines:

Extra -academic activities

- 1. All extra credits claimed under this heading will require sufficient academic input/ contribution from the students concerned.
- 2. Maximum 04 extra credits in each academic year will be allotted.

Additional Credits for Online Courses:

- 1. Courses only from SWAYAM and NPTEL platform are eligible for claiming credits.

- 5. All these credits must be approved by the College Committee.

Additional Credits for Certificate Courses:

- 1. Students can get additional credits (number of credits will depend on the course duration) from certificate courses offered by the college.

- 3. Students who undertake summer projects/ internships/ training in institutions of repute through a national selection process, will get 2 credits for each such activity. This must be done under the supervision of the concerned faculty/mentor.

- 1. The respective documents should be submitted within 10 days after completion of Semester End Examination.
